






### Who is in charge of Antarctica today?

• used peacefully and taken care of.

not exploited or used for animal hunting.

- not involved with military use unless for peaceful purposes.
- not owned by one group.

not ruled by any country and/or continent.

• not used for violence e.g. testing nuclear missiles.
